He is the author of more than 50 publications and is probably best known for his book, *The DOs: Osteopathic Medicine in America*, published by the Johns Hopkins University Press and now in its second edition. He has written widely in such areas as health professions education, medical licensure, the history of alternative medical movements, and early modern medicine in England and New England. He has obtained grants from the National Institutes of Health (National Library of Medicine); the National Endowment for the Humanities; and the U.S. Department of Education and has received three honorary doctorates and three public service awards. Gevitz joined the faculty in 2009 as professor of the history and sociology of medicine in the Department of Family Medicine, and since the spring of 2010, serves as director of the Academic Medicine Scholars Program, taking pride in the accomplishments of those elite medical students who actively participate in and enrich the research and educational activities of the college.
